O R D E R

William Oscar Harris moves for leave to proceed in
forma pauperis.

Harris is currently incarcerated. Pursuant to the
Prison Litigation Reform Act (PLRA), a prisoner is barred
from proceeding in forma pauperis if three or more prior
actions or appeals have been dismissed as frivolous or
malicious or for failure to state a claim:

In no event shall a prisoner bring a civil action or appeal a judgment in a civil action or proceeding under this section if the prisoner has, on 3 or more prior occasions, while incarcerated or detained in any facility, brought an action or appeal in a court of the United States that was dismissed on the grounds that it is frivolous, malicious, or fails to state a claim upon which relief may be granted, unless the prisoner is under imminent danger of serious physical injury.

28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

The court notes that three or more actions or appeals filed by Harris have been dismissed as frivolous, malicious, or for failure to state a claim. *See Harris v. United States*, No. 13-0879 (D.D.C. June 11, 2013); *Harris v. United States*, No. 2:13-cv-214-WTL-MJD (S.D. Ind. July 15, 2013); *Harris v. Fed. Bureau of Prisons*, No. 13-1144 (D.D.C. July 29, 2013). Moreover, Harris has not suggested that he is in imminent danger of serious physical injury.

Accordingly,

IT IS ORDERED THAT:

If Harris does not pay the \$505 filing fee within 30 days of the date of this order, his appeal will be dismissed.
