ORDER AND SUPPORTING MEMORANDUM

The complainant has filed a document that the court construes as a judicial misconduct complaint concerning a judge of the United States District Court for the District of Columbia.*

Pursuant to Rule 7(a)(1), a complaint against a district court judge "must be filed with the circuit clerk in the jurisdiction in which the subject judge holds office." However, if the complaint alleges misconduct in the course of official business while the subject judge was sitting on a court by designation, then the complaint may be filed either with the circuit clerk in the jurisdiction in which the subject judge sat by designation or with the circuit clerk in the jurisdiction in which the subject judge holds office. See Rule 7(b).

The complaint concerns a judge holding office in the jurisdiction of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. The complainant does not

assert that the subject judge sat by designation with the United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit. Thus, the complaint was filed in the wrong circuit, and dismissal of the complaint filed with this court is required pursuant to Rule 11(c)(1)(F).

Accordingly,

The complaint is dismissed.
